In 2005, Amy and a group of Roslyn parents founded NSAC, a 501(c)(3) nonprofit dedicated to funding recreational, socialization, and peer mentoring programs for individuals with autism. Through grant-giving and partnerships with organizations such as the Sid Jacobson JCC, Camp Kehila, The Nassau County Museum of Art, Spectrum Designs, The Nicholas Center for Autism, and Life's WORC, NSAC has made a meaningful difference in the lives of so many.

This year, NSAC is funding several exciting initiatives, including music-based movement classes, nutritional life skills, and fitness programs at the Sid Jacobson JCC. The organization also provided new screen-printing machinery at Spectrum Designs, as well as washers and dryers at Spectrum Suds, creating more employment opportunities and essential life skills training for individuals on the spectrum. Additionally, NSAC supports socialization and inclusion programs within the Roslyn and Wheatley school districts.

Beyond her philanthropic work, Amy has built a thriving career in sales, as an industrial food broker with S. Kamberg and Co. and also as a real estate agent with the Schwartzberg Butner Team at Douglas Elliman. Working alongside a powerhouse team—many of whom have personal connections to the special needs community—Amy is passionate about helping special needs families, firsttime homebuyers, empty nesters, and renters find their perfect homes across Nassau and Suffolk Counties. She has also partnered with a colleague in Florida to assist local residents in securing second homes in the Sunshine State.

Amy recently helped organize NSAC's first 2025 fundraising event, the Dinks and Drinks Pickleball Fundraiser on March 1st. Partnering with the Holes for Hope committee, a group of Roslyn friends who are more like family, the event was a tremendous success in supporting NSAC's mission.
